

It was a huge part of society at the time.


Your class controlled where your lived, your lifestyle, your job and education.


It was also very difficult, if not impossible to move between social classes.




What was life like for a Victorian child?


- A typical day of a Victorian child would have looked very different depending on where they were in the hierarchy.
- We are going to look at the daily life of someone who would have been roughly in the middle of the hierarchy (middle class).













































